Why they chose this trade?

I initially started out my basic training in February 1996, on completion of that I moved to Bordon, Hants for Phase 2 training. I was soon sent to DST Leconfield, where I gained all my driving licences. I then started my training as a Vehicle Mechanic, it was harder than I thought it would be and was asked to re-trade, I was sent to Aldershot AFCO and had to look at alternatives! I had to think,

I remembered having conversations with some of my friends who were doing their basic Recovery Mechanic course at the time, they were telling me that they got to jump in water up to their necks and recovered tanks using a CRARRV (I'd seen them down on the TTA!) and I thought "that sounds amazing!", so I was luckily enough to be allowed to stay within the Corps, and thankfully I passed the course. It was a Summer course, so that made it even better as all I remember is the sun blazing and extraordinarily little rain, and it was a blessing getting a wet job to cool down in after sweating hard on the CRARRV jobs.





Highlights or key experiences of career (trade) to date (the learning moments)

Key highlights for me have been the Operational tours, I've been extremely fortunate, (or unfortunate depending on how you look at it!) that I've been involved in most of the deployments that the British Army has been involved in over the last 20+ years, Bosnia was an eye- opener, I was only 20 years old, only been a Class 2 about 2 months and my Sgt was posted to Cyprus and left. I was left in charge of the recovery post for that Area of Operation and did R&R cover for the Corporals, it was a steep learning curve, it was sink or swim, people were depending on us to keep the routes cleared, so I was pleased that I was successful in everything I was tasked with! I think that tour set me up for success on all my future deployments!

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THE RESERVIST BY - MARK O'MAHONY

Reservist membership is a potential growth area for the branch and as the Committees Reservist Representative and a serving member of 103 Bn, I am ideally placed to focus on the development of this area

My first experience of the 'TA' was in 84 during Ex Lionheart when following a successful recovery of a TM, my Leyland also became a casualty (poor VM crew driving, honest) and was itself recovered by a TA unit on the way 'forward'. I recall flagging down the TA crew commander, he looked 'proper old' (a bit like me today...how time flies). As a WO2, I went on to serve with REME reservist units as a regular SPSI at 2 Recovery Companies, 150 & 118. On leaving the regulars in late 2003 I became a full-time reservist with 118 Rec Coy, becoming ASM of the Coy and later becoming a Commissioned Officer.

Advertising of the branch is going to take various forms, contact through the REME Bn Recy Mech SPSI's to their troops, social media, and Facebook Groups such as the SEME Trg Wing and friends group pages, reunions, the Recy Mech jungle drums and of course Jonny Fulton who seems to know everyone. It is intended to keep all members updated with news updates on Reservist support to deployments, training, support during COVID etc.

My aim is to have reservist membership at 20% this time next year. I have already engaged with contacts at the Rec Coy's and received incredibly positive responses, the branch already has 2 reservists with another 6 persons wanting to join. All are very much looking forwards to meeting comrades not seen since GW1, Bosnia, Kosovo, GW2, Iraq and Afghan and other UN ops they have supported.

EXERCISE HARD PULL 19 - BY SGT D RADFORD PSI 124 REC COY.



On the 14th Sept 19, 102 Fs Bn REME kicked off the Recovery TTX Ex Iron Pull 19, although an Army Reserve Bn, soldiers from across the entire Army began to assemble ready to take part. The TTX was held out of Wathgill Camp and all training was conducted on Catterick Training Area. In total we had just over 100 troops, 52 of which were students so quite a decent camp was expected.

We had two syndicates of class 2 Recy Mechs preparing for their Class 1. Their training had been tailored to best prepare them for Class 1 training as we didn't want

to just "indirect them to death". DSEME have developed the Class 1 course over the years involving a lot more coaching/mentoring and complex recovery tasks. We had a DSEME instructor deliver the theory package for them before hitting the training area, this provided the students a great insight on what to expect when they arrive at DSEME. The practical training began slowly with the regular type jobs (some on the wet side) before ramping up towards the end. The Bedford on its roof in the pond certainly dropped a few arses, to their credit though, they all got stuck in and left the TTX better Recy Mechs than when they arrived.





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The Jellies, 10 syndicates of class 3 Recy Mechs hit the training ground after the usual couple of days refreshing their theory knowledge. As with the Class 2 training, it began slow and ramped up. They had the usual 3 days on trailers, and we had managed to give them extra time on the SVR Heath phase. Great spirit and determination were on display throughout with the usual cheery banter you would expect from a bunch of Recy Mech's playing in the mud. The fact the weather was unusually kind for Catterick probably helped keep the smiles up. Again, all troops really leaned into the training and it was great to see the younger lads asking to



have a crack at the harder tasks by the end of the training.

At the halfway point, a trip to Leeds Armouries had been laid on followed by a cultural tour of Leeds, City "the pubs". At the start of the day, I was a little anxious that we were about to unleash 50+ drunken Recy Mechs into Leeds however to my absolute amazement, no incidents requiring the Police or boxing ring cropped up and everyone made the bus home safe. A great day.





In all the TTX was a huge success, I seen some great prospects at all levels and passionately believe the future of God's trade will be in safe hands.
